#### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

#### WHAT DO WE DO WHEN MEDICINE CAN DO NO MORE?

A priest friend from down South recently shared with me an article about a heartbreaking situation in Fort Worth, Texas. There, Tinslee Lewis, a newborn girl with severe health defects, has been receiving extensive care since her birth. Doctors at the hospital have determined that her conditions are so severe as to be terminal, and have recommended that she be removed from life support; her parents are fighting this ruling.

While this is a unique – and uniquely difficult case – the question of whether or not to continue medical care in the case of extreme or terminal illness is one that any one of us can face. I can recall a time, a few years ago, when I was called into an ethics meeting with a family facing just such a situation. In this case, my counsel was that, while they could continue care if they chose, it was not morally necessary to do so.

What sort of tools does our Catholic tradition give us to figure out what to do in these situations? First, it describes medical care in terms of being either *ordinary* or *extraordinary*. Ordinary means of care have a hope of bringing about a cure, are able to be done, and do not involve a disproportionate difficulty in being given. Extraordinary means can include those that have no hope of bringing about a lasting cure or improvement, or involve disproportionate cost, effort, or pain on the part of the patient. It can also involve overtreatment: carrying out medical interventions with no reasonable expectation of ultimate success. *Reasonableness* is the key concept to keep in mind: if there is real hope that a treatment will work, it is reasonable.

Realizing that a loved one can no longer be helped by medical care is crushing, but is a reality that can happen. In these cases, palliative or therapeutic treatment can be the best care for a loved one. We can never forget that all care, whether in hope of healing or to comfort the dying, is carried out in the hope of eternal life: we care for life as one of God's greatest gifts, but know at the same time that the maintenance of biological life is not the only good to be sought in an extreme situation. As St. John Paul II wrote in *Evangelium Vitae* (#65), "To forego extraordinary or disproportionate means is not the equivalent of suicide or euthanasia; it rather expresses acceptance of the human condition in the face of death."

Not knowing the full details of little Tinslee's case, I will withhold from issuing a judgement here; let's simply keep her, her family and her doctors in our prayers.

## **ON THE COVER**

After Jesus was baptized, he came up from the water and behold, the heavens were opened for him... And a voice came from the heavens, saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." (Mt 3:16-17)

How many of you will contend that if God spoke about you to others that he would declare how well-pleased he is? How many of us could say with certainty that everything we think, say, and do in the course of an average week is well-pleasing to the Lord. Would we not admit at least a few things wanting in ourselves; perhaps more than a few things that God would find unpleasing?

How many of us wake up in the morning with the distinct purpose of pleasing God? Are the first words that pass our lips, "Lord Father, help me to spend this entire day pleasing you"? Perhaps we should consider starting our day like this to be in the correct disposition of love toward God.

Many of us who try to do what is right and just in the eyes of God do so because we want to avoid God's punishment. This is not a bad thing, but it could and should be better. Better for us if we were to do what is right and just in order to please God.

"Father" is the name Jesus revealed to us concerning the One Lord who sent Him to earth. This Holy Name is itself instructive because it implies that we are to become like little children (Mt 18:3) in order to know and love God as an ever-loving Father. That is, we are to put off our worldly "maturity" so as to please God as ever-loving children.

For this year's celebration of the feast of the **Baptism of** the Lord, we have placed on our bulletin cover a work by Adam Elsheimer entitled *Baptism of Christ* (1599). Elsheimer was a German Baroque painter who made his way to Rome absorbing its methods and adapting these to his German training. He eventually converted from Lutheranism to Catholicism. His style was influential on the Germanic (Dutch) traditions of Rembrandt and Rubens, the latter with whom he became friends.

*Baptism of Christ* is a complex work using diagonals. The first traverses from God the Father who sends the Holy Spirit (dove and rays) through a ring of cherubs to descend upon Jesus. The second begins from a large angelic being and two cherubs carrying a kingly robe in which to enwrap Jesus after his baptism.

This painting is also a symbolic piece. The right hand of John (pouring water) and the two outstretched arms of Jesus form the Sign of the Cross used in Baptism. Further, Jesus peers at a man taking off his shoe as if to bathe his feet in the blessed water. This man represents one who is oblivious or even disdainful to the water of grace – one with whom God is not pleased In contrast to this man, the people in the background appear to symbolize various nations that will eagerly come to be baptized in Christ.

Ours is not a difficult choice between following the law of God (in fear of punishment) *or* pleasing God (out of love). Just as Elsheimer integrates his German training into the Roman style, so are we called to incorporate God's laws into the practice of love, so as to fulfill the glorious, divine pleasure.





## **IDEAS FOR PRAYER** By Dom Hubert Van Zeller

What are the things which ordinarily eat away at the foundations of our confidence? Whether honestly acknowledged or covered up by one of a hundred subterfuges, the influences which threaten our peace of mind are roughly the same in most of us. Fear of not being able to keep it up, fear of being exposed as a fraud, fear of going deeper and deeper into illusion and dying in a state of mortal sin, fear of hell.

Then there is the recognition of tendencies within ourselves which we know we shall never be able to master. Bitterness, resentment at the way in which our life has deviated from the course originally set, envy of the success of others, the inability to keep resolutions, the lying, the uncharity, the moodiness, the craving for affection and understanding, the longing to get back to the day when generosity meant everything and when nothing was held back.

If these states of mind are never altogether eliminated, at least they are, in the developing life of trust, rendered more or less harmless. The soul is, whatever else, alerted against the first sign of cynicism. Bewildered and unsure of himself, the man who places all of his trust in God knows well enough, even if he knows nothing else, that the spirit of God is not in cynicism.

**EXPANDED ABORTION IN MA:** The public policy arm of the Catholic Church in Massachusetts, entitled the Massachusetts Catholic Conference, is issuing anothinformation update their website er on at www.macatholic.org. You can go to their site and find on their home page under News and Statements an article which begins as "Important Update: Let Your Voice Be Heard Again...". This page will provide you with an update on the two proposed bills (one for the Massachusetts Senate and one for the House) that would expand abortion access to abortions up to the ninth month while eliminating many requirements such as parental information and consent and the provision of medical care to children who have survived abortion! The laws would also increase state spending for abortion. Please log on MA Catholic Conference website to learn how your voice can be heard again.

**MASS INTENTIONS:** Our Mass Book opened last week on **Wednesday, 8 January**. At that time we took *many* intentions for the period of **July 1<sup>st</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup>**, <u>2020</u>. If you were unable to come to the parish that morning, please call the parish office with your requests and we can assist you over the telephone; *by this time many of the Mass dates will be taken but we will help you to find a suitable date*. (Please note that we can also accommodate Masses offered in Rome for your loved ones during the year of 2020). **WINTER CANCELLATIONS:** As a rule we do not cancel Holy Mass for stormy weather, however we ask that you do not risk driving to the parish church in dangerous weather conditions.

Further, if you are a regularly scheduled Eucharistic adorer you should receive a telephone message from the parish for any cancellations. The telephone number showing up on your Caller-I.D. will be "508-995-7600". Please answer all calls from this phone number since the schedule of cancellation will be in the message. There is often a slight pause in the message system so please do not hang up if you do not hear a voice immediately. The system is set up to leave voice mail in the event of a no-answer.

If you are a regularly scheduled adorer, and do not receive a call in the event of a storm, please contact Steve in the parish center so he can check and update your contact information for future calls. Thank you.

**HOLIDAY OFFICE CLOSING:** On Monday, 19 January, **Martin Luther King Jr. Day**, the parish office will be closed. However, we will still have morning Mass at 9 am and our full Eucharistic Adoration program. Vespers and Confession are cancelled for that evening, but there will be Confession *after* the 9 am Mass on Monday morning. **Please note** that this is our usual liturgical schedule for federal holidays.
