FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

DON'T TAKE MARRIAGE FOR GRANTED!

What is marriage? Living in a time when there is so much debate and disagreement over the institution of marriage, as followers of Jesus Christ it is all the more important that we not only stand fast in our defense of marriage, but also consciously work to strengthen and celebrate it.

Marriage is important not only for the personal happiness of the couple and in the living of faith, but for society as well. One of the reasons that the traditional conception of marriage as one man and one woman raising the children begotten of their union is so important is that, throughout history, this has been the basic unit of society. While this is not the experience of every family – and those who are still faithful in the midst of difficulties or non-traditional situations are true signs of sanctity – this doesn't mean that we cannot at the same time affirm the central place of marriage in society.

Studies have shown that marriage results in a better life for both the spouses and their children. They show that married men, as opposed to single men, exhibit less risky behavior and commit fewer crimes – a clear benefit to society. Marriage results in more stable households, as the husband and wife can together support the work of raising a family. Children being raised by their biological parents also benefit greatly from marriage. A 2012 study by the Heritage Foundation found that "A child's likelihood of living in poverty is reduced by 82 percent if he is raised in a married two-parent family with a mother and father." Children raised by married parents are also less likely to end up in jail and also show greater academic results.

While all of this goes to show the importance of marriage for society, we can't forget that marriage is also one of the vocations to which God calls His faithful. The Church teaches that "the matrimonial covenant, by which a man and a woman establish between themselves a partnership of the whole of life, is by its nature ordered toward the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of offspring; this covenant between baptized persons has been raised by Christ the Lord to the dignity of a sacrament." (*Catechism* para. 1601).

Marriage is a blessing – but never one that can be taken for granted. Our parish is hosting a **day of reflection for married couples** on **Sunday 29 March**. This afternoon will involve reflection on the vows of marriage and other helpful reflections to strengthen your marriages. More information can be found later in this bulletin: I hope every married couple will make the effort to attend. Your marriage will only benefit as a result!

On the Cover

Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted--and you yourself a sword will pierce". (Lk 2:34-35)

Perhaps some of you have attended a baptism where the infant to be anointed was asleep until the time of the sacramental blessing. This makes one wonder about the baby Jesus at His blessing in the Temple of Jerusalem while He was in the secure and restful care of Mary and Joseph.

Yet there appear to be no artistic representations of the infant Jesus sleeping during His Presentation in the Temple forty days after his birth; in most of these images he appears quite awake and active. There are however, excluding the Presentation theme, some famous paintings of Jesus asleep as an infant. Bellini, Mantegna, and Longhi have all painted lovely works of the baby Jesus sleeping. What all these images show in common is the Blessed Mother adoring and meditating upon her divine son.

We know that the Blessed Mother meditated upon her infant son. St. Luke tells us so at least twice (Lk 2:19 & Lk 2:51). Furthermore, what mother has not found "sleep time" the best time to adore the wonderment of her child? However, after her meeting with the temple prophet Simeon, Mary's meditations would have been tinged with foreboding for Simeon told her that she, the Mother of God, would also suffer the contradiction of the Son of God, for "you yourself a sword will pierce". It is this prediction at the Presentation of the Temple, and the Blessed Mother's consequent reflection upon it, which we examine here on this feast day of the same name.

Thus, we have placed on our bulletin cover a most excellent representation of the sleeping infant Jesus by the Mannerist master **Orazio Gentileschi** entitled *Madonna & Child in a Landscape* (1622). Gentileschi was a Tuscan, who moved to Rome, then to Genoa, to France and finally to England where he died in London, once a court painter. He had a daughter, a masterful Baroque painter, Artemisia, who surpassed her father's imitation of Caravaggio.

In our image, Blessed Mary sits leaning against a broken wall anticipating the fallen Temple (Mk 13:1-2) just as she reflects deeply upon the temple of her son's body (Jn 2:19). Mary cradles Jesus gently as he rests in her arms and upon her legs. We might just begin and end our meditation here if it were not for Gentileschi's insight and our present consideration of the words of Simeon.

Gentileschi has painted for us a subtle *Pieta*; a gentle prevision into the Passion. The head of Jesus is limp and tilted back as in scenes of His Deposition while his feet are crossed as in scenes of His Crucifixion. Jesus is asleep but in a posture depicted when He is taken down from the Cross. This image is tender in beauty, but also in sorrow as Mary feels the first prick of the sword that will penetrate to her Immaculate Heart. She sits after the Presentation in a place of desolation yet wraps her divine son in the gold and lapis colors of her cloth mirrored in the sky above, taking the observer beyond the Passion to the glorious Ascension. This is a sign to us that in only a few weeks we too will be ushered into Christ's paschal mystery.

ST. FRANCIS XAVIER PRESCHOOL - GRADE 8



COFFEE AND DONUTS: We will once again have our Sunday morning fellowship with coffee and donuts after the 8:00 am and 10:30 am Masses this weekend. All individuals and families are welcome to join us in the parish center after those Masses.

WEBSITE STATISTICS: An in-house analysis (using Google Analytics) of our parish website usage indicates that in the 2019 calendar year we had 32,286 page views of our parish website. While the highest percentage of these were general searches (those who visited our home page) the next top three page visits are encouraging for their selections.

First, there were 6,816 visits to the Holy Rosary page. The average use time on this page was nearly 5 minutes indicating that many people are using our website and praying along with the Most Holy Rosary recordings. The next highest page viewing was our parish bulletin which was reached 3,804 in 2019. This means that it received an average of about 10 visits per day for the entire year. This is also encouraging since we email the parish bulletin each week to 209 parishioners who are therefore not included in the number of those visiting the bulletin site each week. Further, the average time on the bulletin page was 2 minutes and 31 seconds which means that those visiting the bulletin page are not just curious but actually reading the bulletin itself.

In third place is our parish calendar with 1,244 page views for 2019. This translate into about 3 people each day looking to see what we are doing in the parish and when we are doing it.

Please encourage your family and friends to take a peek at our website to learn more about the parish and the faith. Of course, there is nothing better that you could do than to bring them to the parish church to experience the Mass and Eucharistic Adoration, but perhaps the parish website may give them a head start!
