FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

GRATITUDE AND CONCERN

Thankfully, things are beginning to return to normal. For me, it has been a true blessing to be able to worship with you again at Mass. I would again like to thank you – as I did last weekend – for your cooperation with our precautions. As the old saying goes, an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure.

Being careful has paid off: looking at the chart for new Coronavirus cases in Massachusetts for the past few weeks, the reopening of churches and other places of worship has not had a negative effect on the decline of infections. In fact, they have continued to drop. Let us hope that as more places reopen they will be as serious as churches have been in sanitizing and guiding social distancing.

Thanks must be given where it is due: Governor Baker placed a great deal of trust in places of worship by including us in the first phase of reopening. Even previous to the announcement, he invited the Catholic Church in our state, along with other religious organizations, to be part of a dialogue regarding reopening. This invitation on his part and his subsequent actions in our favor need to be remembered.

This should be remembered not only for its own sake, but also because of the contrast in which they stand in comparison with nearby New York. Both the governor and the mayor of New York City have displayed an antipathy bordering on hostility towards the practice of faith, and indeed faith itself.

On 13 April, Governor Cuomo spoke at a press conference in which he announced the beginning of a decline in new cases of infection. He took a gratuitous swipe at religion by saying to a reporter, "The number is down because we brought the number down. God did not do that. Faith did not do that. Destiny did not do that." He continued, "Our behavior has stopped the spread of the virus. God did not stop the spread of the virus. And what we do, how we act, will dictate how that virus spreads."

On 2 June, Mayor de Blasio of New York City explained that he was allowing huge protests to continue while churches were still banned from having even limited services. He is even allowing restaurants to reopen ahead of churches, which are likely to have to wait until July to reopen. These things are not in opposition: the protests have their place, and the restaurants as well. But if these can reopen or take place, then why not churches? Let's wait and see if he offers an answer.

ON THE COVER

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." (Jn 6:51)

Today is the solemn feast of **Corpus Christi**, or the Most Holy Body and Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ. We ought to celebrate it with an especial glorification in appreciation of our communal homecoming to the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist after an absence of a few months. Hopefully this absence has magnified our devotion to this precious divine gift, a devotion which just a few months ago had been shown to be severely deficient.

As we recall, not long before the COVID-19 virus hit we were talking about recent polling showing that many Catholics no longer believe in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. This was disturbing enough to prompt some bishops and priests to put forth letters and instructions that in Holy Communion we receive the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ. Then the virus hit. The pandemic gained the greatest attention in the Church while the theme of the Holy Eucharist was shelved again as Our Lord became unobtainable not due to any shortage of wheat.

On this feast day we do well to consider the proximity of two Eucharistic occurrences: first, statistical proof that faith in the Holy Eucharist has greatly diminished and second, that this same Holy Eucharist became inaccessible to the faithful.

Now when one occurrence follows upon another, this does not mean that one caused the other. We cannot say with certainty that God withdrew the Holy Eucharist from us as a consequence of our lack of communal faith. However, we cannot wholly discount this either. Nor do we mean to suggest that God sent a deadly virus only to remind us of his Real Eucharistic Presence. Yet, even through a very physical event such as a deadly pandemic, God will inject his own spiritual meaning into the Church. As men we felt deeply the restrictions of the pandemic; as churchmen we felt intensely the withholding of the Blessed Sacrament. As we emerge from these constraints have we grown in our devotion to the Real Presence? Have we come to understand that it is the Holy Eucharist that binds us in faith not only as a sign but as a supernatural grace in the very Divine Person whose Body and Blood we must worthily consume? Do we now realize that we gather on Sunday and everyday to partake in Christ and not merely in some prayed-over bread?

On this **Feast of Corpus Christi** we place on our bulletin cover a detail of a work by the French realist **James Tissot** entitled The *Communion of the Apostles* (1894 – Brooklyn Museum). Tissot was influenced by Degas and Manet although Tissot never fully transitioned to Impressionism, keeping one individualized foot in the realm of romantic realism.

Here we have a work reminiscent of the earth tones of Rembrandt which lend a somber solemnity to its telling. Christ appears as a "priest of Melchizedek" wearing a humeral veil held aside reverently by Saints Peter and John. This is a very liturgical piece so that even the table appears as an altar rail. Jesus distributes Holy Communion indicating that this *is* His Body while the Apostles kneel in worship. The thirteenth figure kneeling with face unseen must be our Blessed Mother. Let us likewise adore Jesus in His most Blessed Sacrament.


ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ACUSHNET, MASSACHUSETTS




The Gathering of the Manna James Tissot (1902)

"Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died. whoever eats this bread will live forever." (In 6:57-58)

A Reflection on Christ's Priesthood on the Event of a Priestly Ordination:

[Christ's priesthood is his ordained role] to offer sacrifice and prayer for humanity to his heavenly Father. His ordination or anointing to the office of high priest took place at the moment of the Incarnation, i.e., at the moment when the Word of God assumed human flesh in the womb of Mary. During his life on earth Christ exercised his priestly office by all the acts of his will, and then at the Last Supper and on Calvary he united all these mortal acts into one supreme sacrifice to the Father. Along with the sacrifice, Christ also prays as a priest, notably when he instituted the Eucharist and in the sacerdotal prayer recorded by St. John (17:1-26). Moreover, Christ's priesthood continues everlastingly in heaven, as revealed in the Letter to the Hebrews. Regarding the manner in which he exercises his eternal priesthood, revelation merely says: "He is always making intercession for us" (Hebrews 7:25; Romans 8:34), which is a truly sacerdotal function because, as St. Paul affirms, it bears an intimate relation to the sacrifice of the Cross. In fact, Christ's continuing priesthood is the basis in faith for the existence and efficacy of the sacrifice of the Mass (from Catholic Culture's - Catholic Dictionary).


