FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

ANOTHER LOSS IN 2020

Adding to the list of losses this year is a name that is not well known, but should be: Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, one of the most distinguished rabbis of Great Britain. Rabbi Sacks consistently and eloquently spoke out in favor of the moral truth of the Judeo-Christian tradition. He spoke both on what religion can offer the modern world, and also to critique religion for not being true to itself. I encourage you to explore his writings at https://rabbisacks.org/.

Providentially, one of his last reflections offers us some very wise guidance for this point in time. Reflecting on the call of Abraham, he writes,

Leaders lead. That does not mean to say that they do not follow. But what they follow is different from what most people follow. They don't conform for the sake of conforming. They don't do what others do merely because others are doing it. They follow an inner voice, a call. They have a vision, not of what is, but of what might be. They think outside the box. They march to a different tune.

Never was this more dramatically signaled than in the first words of God to Abraham, the words that set Jewish history in motion: "Leave your land, your birthplace and your father's house and go to the land that I will show you. (Gen. 12:1)"

Why? Because people do conform. They adopt the standards and absorb the culture of the time and place in which they live — "your land." At a deeper level, they are influenced by friends and neighbors — "your birthplace." More deeply still they are shaped by their parents, and the family in which they grew up — "your father's house."

I want you, says God to Abraham, to be different. Not for the sake of being different, but for the sake of starting something new: a religion that will not worship power and the symbols of power — for that is what idols really were and are. I want you, said God, to "teach your children and your household afterward to follow the way of the Lord by doing what is right and just" (Gen. 18:19).

Going on to reflect on the impact the Jewish people have had on the world, he writes that, "It is hard to lead alone, far less hard to lead in the company of others even if you are a minority." It is the community of the Jewish people, united in their faithfulness to God and to their traditions, that has enabled them to make this impact.

Although we are of a different faith and nationality, his words speak a language of faith that we, whose faith is based in Judaism, can understand. Believing Christians are more and more of a minority in our culture, but we can't think that to mean we can't make a difference. Great things will come if each of us, as believers in God, remain true to our faith, as well as to the community – the Church – that encourages that faith to develop.

EXCEL IN LEARNING AND LIFE: Bishop Stang, a Catholic, college-preparatory high school in Dartmouth, MA, will administer the Scholastic High School Placement Test (HSPT) on Saturdays, December 5th and 12th from 8:00 am – 11:00 am. Incoming 9th grade applicants may choose either date for virtual or inperson testing. Visit bishopstang.org for more details or to complete the required pre-registration. Merit scholarship incentives are available.

MASS COUNT: During the rest of November our ushers will be implementing the annual Mass count for the diocese. Each year the diocese requires that we take a census of Mass attendance during 4 weeks in November. Since we are already operating at a lower church capacity (even with the extra Sunday Mass) we do not expect that this year will compare well with past years, however it should give the diocese a sense of Mass attendance at each parish during this present pandemic. If you see an usher clicking a handheld counter when you enter the church, you will now know why!

GROCERY CARDS: Because during this time we want to limit close gatherings and blocked passageways in the parish church, we are continuing to *not* sell grocery cards for Stop & Shop, Trucchi's and Shaw's after the weekend Masses. Still, if you would like to purchase these (the church receives 5% of every purchase) you may still do so through the parish center office. Please email Steve at sng@sfxparish.com or call him at 508-995-7600 at the parish center to request the store of preference and the denomination amounts. These cards come in \$10, \$25, \$50, and \$100 denominations. You can purchase these for your own shopping or for charitable or gift giving.

OPTIONS MEDICAL RETURNS: In lieu of our annual baby bottle campaign we made envelopes available for parishioners to make donations to this local pregnancy resource center which offers much support to many woman in need and their expected children. If you picked up an envelope and are able to make a donation, please do so by Sunday 22 November so we can send off all our parish support to Options Medical before the Thanksgiving Holiday - Thank you!

THANKSGIVING HOLIDAY & EUCHARISTIC ADORATION: We will be adjusting Eucharistic Adoration hours due to the approaching Thanksgiving Holiday which falls on Thursday 26 November. We will *not* hold the usual Vespers and Benediction on Wednesday evening. Therefore there will be no Wednesday overnight or Thursday Adoration due to the holiday. Instead, Eucharistic Adoration will be suspended just before the 9:00 am daily Mass on Tuesday 24 November. Adoration will not resume until Friday 27 November after the 9:00 am Mass. Thank you to all the adorers of our Eucharistic program. We are very thankful for you!



PRESCHOOL - GRADE 8



2nd Reading: 1 Thes 5:1-6

When people are saying, "Peace and security," then sudden disaster comes upon them, like labor pains upon a pregnant woman, and they will not escape. But you, brothers and sisters, are not in darkness, for that day to overtake you like a thief. For all of you are children of the light and children of the day. We are not of the night or of darkness. Therefore, let us not sleep as the rest do, but let us stay alert and sober.
