FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A POETIC REFLECTION ON ST. FRANCIS

While the celebration of our patronal feast on 3 December was different this year, as a parish and school community we were still able to commemorate St. Francis Xavier as best we could. The fifth-grade class at our school were aided by their teacher, Mrs. Laurie Bentley, in writing the following poem that I want to share with

Saint Francis Xavier, Our Patron

Saint Francis Xavier grew up in a castle, And lost his dad when he was young. He went to college and made some mistakes. His heart changed when he realized that he'd become high-strung.

Ignatius encouraged him to repent. Francis's penance was extreme. He tied up his arms, he prayed, and he fasted. Ignatius and Xavier were a very holy team.

Xavier became a missionary priest, And led an exemplary life. He spread the gospel across many nations, Overcoming much suffering and strife.

Xavier was drawn to the sick, And even gave them his own bed. While on his ship he would find an anchor On which he would rest his head.

Xavier encouraged conversion Speaking of God's mercy with every breath. He made an impact throughout the world Until his untimely death.

As I read over the poem, I thought of how it highlights a couple of lessons on how we can emulate St. Francis in our own lives:

- Penance and Conversion: As the poem says, St. Francis didn't live a perfect life. As he grew in faith he realized the need to give more of his life over to Christ. He both did penance for his sins and actively tried to live a holier life. The same dynamic is always true for us, no matter where we're at in our spiritual journey.
- Zeal to Share Christ with Others: St. Francis Xavier cared for both the bodies and souls of others - taking care of the physically sick, and sharing the message of the Gospel with those who did not know Christ. Again, how can we do the same?








ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ACUSHNET, MASSACHUSETTS





ON THE COVER

For this 3nd Sunday of Advent we read in the first Mass reading from the Prophet Isaiah, "The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring glad tidings to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners, to announce a year of favor from the LORD and a day of vindication by our God".

Now these words were written by Isaiah some seven centuries before Jesus the Messiah read them aloud in the synagogue in Nazareth on the Sabbath. Jesus of course read this from the sacred scroll as a selfrevelation to those listening.

Many years earlier as a boy Jesus spoke with the Jewish scholars in the Temple in Jerusalem. The bible does not indicate what Jesus said except that those who listened were astounded at his understanding. We place on our bulletin cover a work by James Tissot, Jesus Found in the Temple (courtesy Brooklyn Museum). We ask you to reflect upon Jesus just as Mary and Joseph do in this image while holding out the arms of Jesus who accomplishes all that Isaiah predicted upon His Holy Cross.

1st Reading: Is 61:1-2a, 10-11

The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring glad tidings to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners, to announce a year of favor from the LORD and a day of vindication by our God. I rejoice heartily in the LORD, in my God is the joy of my soul; for he has clothed me with a robe of salvation and wrapped me in a mantle of justice, like a bridegroom adorned with a diadem, like a bride bedecked with her jewels. As the earth brings forth its plants, and a garden makes its growth spring up, so will the Lord GOD make justice and praise spring up before all the nations.

Responsorial Psalm: My soul rejoices in my God

2nd Reading: 1 Thes 5:16-24

Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus. Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophetic utterances. Test everything; retain what is good. Refrain from every kind of evil. May the God of peace make you perfectly holy and may you entirely, spirit, soul, and body, be preserved blameless for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The one who calls you is faithful, and he will also accomplish it.

Gospel Reading: Jn 1:6-8, 19-28

A man named John was sent from God. He came for testimony, to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He was not the light, but came to testify to the light. And this is the testimony of John. When the Jews from Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to him to ask him, "Who are you?" He admitted and did not deny it, but admitted, "I am not the Christ." So they asked him, "What are you then? Are you Elijah?" And he said, "I am not." "Are you the Prophet?" He answered, "No." So they said to him, "Who are you, so we can give an answer to those who sent us? What do you have to say for yourself?" He said: "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'make straight the way of the Lord,'" as Isaiah the prophet said." Some Pharisees were also sent. They asked him, "Why then do you baptize if you are not the Christ or Elijah or the Prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water; but there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie." This happened in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.
