FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A HOLY YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH

On 8 December Pope Francis gave an early Christmas gift to the Church by declaring the beginning of a Year of St. Joseph. With his characteristic spontaneity, the year began on the day it was proclaimed and will continue until 8 December 2021.

While that is the date of the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, this year it was also the 150th anniversary of the proclamation of St. Joseph as Patron of the Church. That is, St. Joseph protects the Church with his prayers in a special way.

Pope Francis announced this new year with a letter entitled *Patris Corde*, meaning "With a Father's Heart." He shares that his inspiration came from current events:

My desire (to proclaim this year) increased during these months of pandemic, when we experienced, amid the crisis, how our lives are woven together and sustained by ordinary people, people often overlooked. People who do not appear in newspaper and magazine headlines, or on the latest television show, yet in these very days are surely shaping the decisive events of our history. Doctors, nurses, storekeepers and supermarket workers, cleaning personnel, caregivers, transport workers, men and women working to provide essential services and public safety, volunteers, priests, men and women religious, and so very many others...Each of us can discover in Joseph — the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence — an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble. Saint Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation.

Pope Francis continues by sharing how St. Joseph serves both as a guide and an intercessor for us: as a father who is beloved, tender and loving, obedient, accepting, creatively courageous, working, and at peace while operating in the shadows.

We will have time to unpack these in the coming year; for now, I will close by sharing with you Pope Francis' prayer to St. Joseph with which he concludes his letter:

Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. To you God entrusted his only Son; in you Mary placed her trust; with you Christ became man.

Blessed Joseph, to us too, show yourself a father and guide us in the path of life. Obtain for us grace, mercy and courage, and defend us from every evil. Amen.

CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEARS ADORATION & EVENING PRAYER SCHEDULE: For Christmas we will suspend Eucharistic Adoration beginning on Tuesday, 22 Dec just before the 9 am Mass resuming Adoration on Monday, 28 December after the 9 am Mass. Please note that there will be no Vespers & Benediction on Wednesday 23 December.

For New Year's, Eucharistic Adoration will be suspended beginning on Tuesday 29 December (just before the 9 am Mass) with resumption on Monday, 4 January after the 9 am Mass. Please note also that there will be no Vespers & Benediction on Wednesday 30 December.

Please also note that the **Christmas season runs to January 10th**, so please come as often as you are able to daily Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, and Christmas Vespers & Benediction.





ON THE COVER

On Christmas Day we read in the first Mass reading at the Midnight Mass from the Prophet Isaiah, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone. You have brought them abundant joy and great rejoicing".

We place on our parish bulletin cover for the 4th Sunday in Advent (and for Christmas Day) a lovely work by the Spanish master Bartolome Esteban Murillo entitled Adoration of the Shepherds (1650). Murillo was a painter of the Baroque period yet his works did not "ascend heaven" as so many beautiful paintings and statues did in that era. His was a simple Spanish realism that still touched upon the classical reserve of the Renaissance, yet he experimented with the newer Tenebrist style famous for contrasting darkness with light.

Here, in this work, Christ is the sole source of light. True to our Catholic faith, it is the Blessed Virgin Mary who opens up and reveals for us the un-blanketed light of the beloved Son of God. This illumination radiating from the Christ-child is both symbolic of His divinity and of the light of God's grace which surpasses even the wonder of natural light; for it has the power to save souls. We see the shepherds, symbolic of the many souls living out in the wilderness, yet drawn to the light as is every soul which is open to an encounter with God. Still, many souls prefer to remain in the darkness.

It is our baptismal duty to call them out into the light of Christ. It is our Christmas joy which must draw them out of doubt and fear into God's glorious light!

And I will make you famous like the great ones of the earth. I will fix a place for my people Israel; I will plant them so that they may dwell in their place without further disturbance. Neither shall the wicked continue to afflict them as they did of old, since the time I first appointed judges over my people Israel. I will give you rest from all your enemies. The LORD also reveals to you that he will establish a house for you. And when your time comes and you rest with your ancestors, I will raise up your heir after you, sprung from your loins, and I will make his kingdom firm. I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me. Your house and your kingdom shall endure forever before me; your throne shall stand firm forever."

And behold, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing will be impossible for God." Mary said, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.
