FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

IS THE COVID-19 VACCINE ETHICAL?

Having received several questions about the moral acceptability of receiving the different vaccines for Covid, I want to share with you a helpful resource. I know the image below is small, and so have put larger printouts on the bulletin boards for your reference.

As this shows, both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines were ethically developed without cells derived from aborted fetuses; later testing did involve some use of these. The AstraZeneca vaccine was both developed and tested using these abortion-derived cells.

An instruction from the National Bishop's Conference of 14 December said that both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are morally acceptable to receive. The Astra-Zeneca one should be avoided if an alternative is available; however, the bishops said that "It may turn out that one does not really have a choice of vaccine, at least, not without a lengthy delay in immunization that may have serious consequences for one's health and the health of others.. In such a case ... it would be permissible to accept the AstraZeneca vaccine."

WEEKEND CHURCH SEATING PLAN: We continue to work hard each week to ensure that all parishioners and others can have a seat at Sunday Mass. It is because of our advanced planning, the additional Sunday Mass, and the diligent work of our ushers that we have been able to accommodate a reasonable and safe attendance at Holy Mass during a pandemic. Here, we would like to review a few points we are often asked about.

First, we still ask that you call the parish office if you are just returning to Mass so we can place you on the parish seating plan.

Second, if you do call and the Mass you desire to attend is full (on paper) you may still come to that Mass. We only ask that you arrive about 10 minutes before Mass begins so the ushers may be able to judge better by that time as to who is coming and who is not coming so they might know better where to seat you. In the parish office we generally do not take families off the schedule if they do not attend their scheduled time here and there. However, many absences may result in one's name being taken off the schedule.

Third, if on any given week you are not able to attend please email or call Janine Hammarquist in the parish office. In this way the ushers will be able to be provided with information that the particular pew you are seated in will be vacant for that particular day and time.

Lastly, as of now there is no need to make a reservation at a daily or First Friday Mass. Mass attendance has never been so high as to go beyond the pandemic seating space up to this point.

Thank you and if you have any questions regarding seating at Mass, please call the parish office.

MASS INTENTIONS: will open again on Wednesday, 6 January 2021 after the 9am Mass for the period of July 1^{st} to December 31^{st} , <u>2021</u>. If you are unable to come to the parish that morning, please call the parish office on or after January 6th and we can assist you over the telephone; we will not be taking intentions for this second half of 2021 prior to January 6th. (Please note that we can still also accommodate Masses offered in Rome for your loved ones during the rest of the year of 2021 from this January onward).

As in the past, there will be on January 6th the usual procedure of standing in line to reserve 3 Mass Intentions and returning to the back of the line (if one desires) for no more than 2 more, bringing the maximum to 5 Masses that can be scheduled that day. This allows us to keep the line moving and provides fairness to all those seeking Mass intentions.

IMPORTANT: However, due to the pandemic guidelines, no one will be admitted into the parish center without wearing a mask and social distancing will be respected. If you would prefer to call the office rather than come in person, please do so. Someone will take your Mass requests over the phone and these will be fit into the Mass intention book after all the Masses are recorded by those who come in person.


Preschool - Grade 8

ON THE COVER

On this feast day of the **Epiphany of the Lord** we celebrate the revelation and adoration of Jesus, the Christ Child.

Now one cannot adore what has not been revealed. Revelation always comes prior to adoration. When that which is divine is revealed it is the natural desire of man to adore this. Yet the divine often goes unnoticed. This is not surprising since when Jesus came on the scene with heavenly words and mighty deeds even then many refused to believe in Him. It is the unfortunate plight of man that he gives more import to what he is to eat and drink and what he is to wear than to the One who comes and gives all such good things (Mt 6:25; 33). Many who wait for God wait for a feast rather than a savior. However, it is as St. Paul says: "... the kingdom of God is not a matter of food and drink, but of righteousness, peace, and joy in the holy Spirit" (Rom 14:17). Thus it is those who await the kingdom of God as a place of justice and reconciliation who will come to be satisfied.

Jesus Christ brings complete satisfaction. Mary his mother, Joseph his foster-father, the shepherds of the field, the Magi who come from the afar, and the angels on high are all elated in adoration of the Child Jesus. Jesus will grow; he will endure much to gain our salvation, but today is a day simply to adore the Lord in the company of those who first came to adore Him.

We offer you this opportunity with an image on our bulletin cover painted in the 15^{th} century by the Florentine **Sandro Botticelli** entitled The *Adoration of the Magi* (1476). In this early Renaissance (yet almost pre-Mannerist) painting Jesus is adored from all directions. Let us do the same, adoring him from all corners of the earth.

Raise your eyes and look about; they all gather and come to you: your sons come from afar, and your daughters in the arms of their nurses. Then you shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow, for the riches of the sea shall be emptied out before you, the wealth of nations shall be brought to you. Caravans of camels shall fill you, dromedaries from Midian and Ephah; all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the LORD.

Brothers and sisters: You have heard of the stewardship of God's grace that was given to me for your benefit, namely, that the mystery was made known to me by revelation. It was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

Gospel Reading: Mt 2:1-12

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.
